Pay: Writers are seeking
increased compensation for
their work, particularly on
streaming services. Streaming
services typically pay writers a
flat fee per episode, regardless
of how many times the episode
is streamed. This means that
writers can earn significantly
less money for their work on
streaming services than they do
for their work on traditional
television.

 Residuals: Writers are also seeking increased residuals for their work. Residuals are payments that writers receive when their work is rerun or distributed in other ways. The WGA is seeking to increase the amount of residuals that writers receive, as well as to expand the number of ways in which writers can earn residuals.

 Job security: Writers are also concerned about job security.
 The rise of streaming services has led to a decline in the number of scripted television shows being produced. This has made it more difficult for writers to find work, and has led to a decrease in wages and benefits.

I've said it before but writers aren't Luddites. We embrace new technologies all the time. What we don't want is for our studio employers to use AI to pay writers less and make our careers even more insecure. Even a robot understands that.
